in this book joseph pleck examines and analyzes the full body of research literature on the male role that has appeared since the 1930s and subjects it to a devastating critique he identifies the components of the male sex role paradigm which has been the basis of research for the past forty years and notes numerous instances of blatant misrepresentation of data twisted reinterpretations of disconfirming results misogyny homophobia and class bias he proposes a new theory the sex role strain paradigm offers a reinterpretation of sex role stereotyping and a critique of research by sociobiologists that allegedly demonstrates a biological basis for male aggression

although images of women in the mass media have been widely discussed in recent years there is no equivalent analysis of men once again masculinity seems to have succeeded in passing itself off as universal and invisible in this book antony easthope argues that far from being universal the main tradition of masculinity in the west is both specific and peculiar what is masculinity drawing up psychoanalysis and an understanding of ideology easthope shows how the masculine myth forces men to try to be masculine and only masculine denying their feminine side in an original contribution to the understanding of gender he analyzes masculinity as it is represented in a wide range of mass media films television newspapers pop music and pulp novels why are two men in a john wayne western more concerned with each other than with the women in their lives is aggressive male banter a sign that men hate or love each other why does a jealous man always have to see his rival written in lively witty and accessible style this book is certain to become controversial but essential reading for a wide range of courses in popular culture mass media and cultural studies as well as those in film study literature and sociology from back cover

this volume shows how masculinity is a socially constructed entity with a definition that has evolved over time masculine icons heroes and methods of male socialization allow for contextual examination of specific time periods which is necessary to understand the concept of western masculinity the volume presents two masculinities representing the aristocracy and the warrior class notions of how to be a man that have vied for dominance throughout most of western culture

myth masculinity me by david m martin in today's gender revolution we often hear people identifying as more or less masculine or more or less feminine but do we really know what masculinity is is it a concrete and definable category or something that is more ambiguous and mutable in this book the author takes the reader along with him on his personal journey exploring his relationship with and growing understanding of masculinity along the way the reader will hear about both healthy and unhealthy or toxic masculinity the way is perilous and strewn with personal landmines and pathogenic beliefs inherited from culture family and institutions this book utilizes an archetypal and mytho poetic framework to analyze experience and form a new relationship to masculinity and the innermost self through the story of peter pan the author analyzes archetypal masculinity from infancy through childhood next the author takes the reader through the strange case of dr jekyll and mr hyde to discuss the major split most men face between their inner reality exterior persona and the shadow

that lurks behind them finally the author takes a bold leap into the story of beowulf to battle the dragons of cultural stereotypes falsely imposed limitations and dangerous self beliefs that affect the individual not just as a man but as a human this is one man s story it is about learning and taking responsibility for the kind of life we ultimately want to lead as well as the kind of world we want to leave behind to those who follow

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drawing on extensive field research conducted in north america and britain over a twenty year period this book challenges masculine myth making mindful of a rich sociological tradition that seeks to understand the social world as lived and experienced the authors provide insights that are likely to challenge common perceptions of various groups of men and boys their diverse physical cultures shared ways of being and identities

many myths surround male bodies and associated bodywork especially when such bodywork is labelled culturally or socially atypical or problematic bodybuilding for example has been explained in terms of gender inadequacy and an adonis complex akin to reverse anorexia while men electing to undergo aesthetic cosmetic surgery are deemed too concerned about their appearance and thus woman like myths also discredit men and boys who do not engage in appropriate bodywork when this is expected for instance amidst public health concerns surrounding a so called obesity epidemic men and boys who resist physical activity and or attempts to promote a healthy weight are deemed ignorant apathetic and in need of correction drawing on extensive field research conducted in north america and britain over a twenty year period this book challenges such masculine myth making mindful of a rich sociological tradition that seeks to understand the social world as lived and experienced the authors provide insights that are likely

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a redefinition of gender and of masculinity and femininity which may liberate men and women from constrictions imposed by dominant past models

this bold new reading of orwell s work focuses upon his representation of communities and the myths that shape them it analyzes his interpretations of class gender and nationality within the context of the period the book uses a range of texts to argue that orwell attempted to integrate traditional communal identities with socialist politics

myth identity and conflict a comparative analysis of romanian and serbian textbooks by anamaria dutceac segesten is an examination of how history and politics became entangled in

romania and serbia in it segesten asks questions like is myth present in the history textbooks of romania and serbia if so are there differences in the ways these myths define the in group and the relationship with the other between a country that experienced interethnic conflict serbia and a country that did not romania do textbooks affect the odds that conflict will occur segesten s findings confirm the presence of mythologized versions of the past in the history textbooks of both countries over the entire fifteen year period studied 1992 2007 despite claims for professionalization of textbook making myths of noble origins of heroism and victimhood appear in both cases segesten finds the language to be ideological and in favor of the ethnic majority even if over time there is a slow tendency towards moderation especially in romania probably due to the influence of the european union ultimately myth identity and conflict by anamaria dutceac segesten questions the alleged power of history textbooks to make a difference in ethnically divided societies prone to conflicts

this book studies some important myths of masculinity in various popular genres including the western the horror film rock music and pornography the author argues that popular culture gives us highly complex and ambivalent images of men the hero turns into the anti hero feminine and homoerotic material leak in the male is often shown as the victim attention is also paid to important theoretical issues in gender studies and cultural studies such as identification and the relation between subject and text

the citizen soldier is a central figure in canada s social memory of the first world war but is the ideal of being a citizen first and a soldier only by necessity an unchanging feature of the canadian identity this compelling history traces the evolution of the canadian amateur military tradition in the turbulent years from 1896 to 1921 before the great war canada s military culture was in transition as canada navigated an uncertain relationship with the united states and fought an imperial war in south africa gradually the untrained civilian replaced the long serving volunteer militiaman as the archetypal amateur soldier setting the country down a path leading directly to the battlefields of flanders and northern france militia myths reveals the history of a military culture that consistently employed the citizen soldier as its foremost symbol but was otherwise in a state of profound change

toxic masculinity is not a law of nature but a cultural construct that has been shaped and solidified over millennia at its center is achilles the archetypal hero of the iliad a figure who has been cited revered and amplified as a male ideal for 2 500 years from alexander the great to caesar and augustus through medieval knights renaissance humanists and modern military leaders drawing on gender studies cultural history and social science theory this study examines how toxic masculinity emerged became entrenched and continues to stabilize patriarchal power structures today it explains why achilles legacy still shapes both men and women and why hegemonic masculinity functions as a tool of power a key to understanding the origins of toxic masculinity

edgar allan poe exerted a profound influence on many aspects of 20th century culture and continues to inspire composers filmmakers writers and artists popularly thought of as a horror writer poe was also a philosophical aesthete a satirist a hoaxer a psychologist and a prophet of the anxieties and preoccupations of the modern world alphabetically arranged this book explores poe's major works both in their own right and in terms of their impact on others including baudelaire who translated his works into french debussy rachmaninoff and

the alan parsons project who set them to music roger corman federico fellini and jean epstein who interpreted his visions for film audiences and television shows such as the six million dollar man and time tunnel which borrowed his imagery and in the case of the simpsons sent it up a wide range of other responses to his compelling tales of mystery and imagination his poetry and the theoretical writings combine strongly to suggest that poe s legacy will indeed last forevermore

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
